As it regards your leaving Best Farms, from what I have learned of your present & former life, & the people, I am satisfied it is no place for you to live in, nor to be occupied with such persons as you may meet there. It never would have been congenial to your feelings & habits of mind, & of manners, now living as you do, among such people as those you are about to leave. But though it was quite as well for you to leave when you did. But though of going so much for a long time, my eyes & health were not good, & you have not added to the weight of your purse, yet no doubt your money & labor a portion of your time & money will be spent in preparing for a long & tedious journey, & you will be of lasting benefit to you, in many ways, by being exposed to various kinds of experience in this world. & some of which you may never be sensible of in this world.
