to return when will at least assure you and which I have
just received from Head quarter at Ripley C. sometime
ago some 700 & slaves runaway from Ky. and colonized
themselves without their masters conduct to the
Britannic Majesty's Dominion in Canada. As much for
that "people of cruel and baseless costes" there were quite a
number of them from the other side of the "great water" of

the Ohio in and about Ripley hunting those who could not
be persuaded to leave their masters if liberty was offered.
They thought it best to lie about the houses of certain
noted Abolitionists in the vicinity of Ripley, thus they hoped
to catch them assyting there to get away. It happened that Mr John
McCoy house was watched among the rest. (Mr. McCoy is a
very noted abolitionist a fearless man and lived some
six or eight miles from town) one night as they were
watching his house, it so happened as it often doth with mankind
that Mr. McCoy had occasion to get up and go out and as he
opened the door they saw and hid behind the ash bushes
and walked up to it as if nothing was the matter and leaned
against it and pissed a way in their fases and then locked
back into the house and the hid. They had to lie and take
it patiently for they were afraid to stir for fear of
getting a sound drubbing and being known. What do you think
